Project Updates

The sheep, horse, cattle, and swine barns are undergoing major, multi-year renovations. All facilities are being updated with improvements tailored to each barn's specific needs from floors, lighting, offices, restrooms, and more.

Horse Barn

This two-year, \$13.1 million project is being completed in two phases. Phase I was finished before the 2025 Fair, and Phase II began after the 2025 Fair and will conclude before the 2026 Fair. Upgrades include masonry and roofing restoration, new radiant-heat concrete floors, relocated offices, accessible restrooms, improved wash rack areas, new portable stalls, enhanced ventilation, upgraded electrical and lighting systems, and a new fire suppression system.

Sheep Barn

The two-year, \$6.2 million renovation was completed in fall 2024. Improvements included masonry restoration, office remodels, new storm sewer installation, roofing repairs, fully accessible restrooms, interior repainting, sun-shading for the show arena, and a new show ring. New portable pens are being added for 2026.

Cattle Barn

While the full renovation scope is still being finalized, Phase I began after the 2025 Fair. This phase focuses on construction of a new electrical distribution building for upgraded service and storage.

Swine Barn

With the overall project still being developed, Phase I started after the 2025 Fair. This phase includes remodeling the west office, upgrading the west women's restroom for accessibility, and adding new men's, women's, and family restrooms on the east end.



For the past 10 to 15 years, **Tammy Newton, Beth Steven, and Sherri Cooney** have been a familiar and dependable presence at Blue Ribbon Foundation events. They volunteer together each year, bringing experience, teamwork, and a strong friendship built through family ties and shared history. Sherri and Tammy are sisters-in-law, and Beth has been a close friend long before Fair volunteering became a tradition.

Tammy and Beth began volunteering through Wellmark's employee volunteer program, while Sherri found similar opportunities through Principal. What started as a way to give back quickly became an annual tradition they looked forward to, and over time they began volunteering together.

State Fairs: Growing American Craft at the Smithsonian

Did you know the Iowa State Fair is being featured at the Smithsonian? The Fair is part of an exhibition called *State Fairs: Growing American Craft* at the Smithsonian American Art Museum's Renwick Gallery in Washington, D.C. The exhibit runs through September 7, 2026.

The exhibit shows off some of the best work from state fairs across the country and Iowa has a strong presence. Visitors can see handmade quilts, a pyramid of home-canned fruits and vegetables (pictured below), and a life-sized butter cow (pictured above), sculpted on-site for the exhibition.

These displays highlight the creativity and hard work that go into Fair competitions. Things that are usually seen at the Iowa State Fair each summer are now being shared with visitors from across the nation at the Smithsonian.
